You have heard of Mother Goose. Call me Father Duck. For those who remember our ducks from last year. We successfully hatched 37 this year. Lord we got some ducks now."





Jerry's biography says: "His work has been featured many times on NASA's Astronomy Photo of the Day, and has been included in exhibits by the National Geographic Society, Space Telescope Science Institute Hubble Heritage Program, Smithsonian Institution National Air and Space Museum, American Museum of Natural History, and Through the Lens: National Geographic's Greatest Photographs. Lodriguss' astronomical photography of objects such as nebulae and galaxies has appeared in books and magazines all over the world.

He is recognized as an expert in the field of DSLRastrophotography and the digital enhancement and correction of deep-sky color astrophotographs. He has lectured and written extensively and has published four books: Photoshop for Astrophotographers, Catching the Light, A Guide to Astrophotography with Digital SLR Cameras and A Guide to DSLR Planetary Photography."
