
The White Helmet

Champion



In case you can't read the inscription it says:

Brother Melchior Polowy

Coach

"Between the time he organized the first wrestling team at Holy Cross in 1944 and his retirement from coaching in 1968, Brother Melchior led the Tigers to a 23-1 record in



state championship meets.

His Holy Cross team met and defeated Newman in the first wrestling dual meet reported in Louisiana. The New Orleans Athletic Club sponsored the state's first prep wrestling tournament and the Tigers won it, claiming their first state title.

Except in 1951, when Holy Cross did not compete, and in 1968, when East Jefferson edged Holy Cross by two points, the Tigers never lost a state meet under his direction. Brother Melchior died in 1997. The state wrestling championship trophies in each division bears his name."

Louis Reuther. I believe that the actual trophy for the Louisiana State Champions (which travels to the winning school yearly) has his picture on it.

 $\mathcal{Daw}Mcg$? The write up does say, "The state wrestling championship trophies in each division bears his name."

The Brother Melchior Trophies are presented to the head coach of the championship teams in Divisions I, II and III.

Larry J Folse: I will always remember the class I had on the third floor of the old building. Can't remember what class it was but the actual classroom was made up of the backs of the lockers for the wrestling team as two walls on either side. One afternoon during class Brother Melchior decided to climb up on a chair on the other side and just peer over the lockers at us. He had that devious smile on his face. Slowly we all began to notice him and started to laugh. It took whoever was teaching that day a while to get what was going on. As slowly and quietly as he appeared, he sunk back down behind the lockers. Despite his rugged exterior he had a great sense of humor and a heart of gold.

I also had him for a class and I remember the convincing rod - a metal rod with a hard rubber ball on the end! Brother Melchior would come up from behind and if you were screwing around in class you would be convinced to behave!

Louis Reuther: He would run us up and down the levee until one of us stumbled, or fell, or passed out!

Bobby Wahl: I remember he liked to collect doubloons

Ricky Zimmer. He melted them down to make weights

Stephen Kruse: Remembered working during the summer at the school painting and grounds keeping with Brother Melchior. There was never a dull moment with him around after he got a new tractor. One time he tried to pull a stump out the ground and the stump did not move an inch and the tractor front end went in the air. Had all of us laughing our butts off.

The Story Behind Br Melchior's Plaque

There is a long story to the plaque. My company produced the plaque for a third party that put them in the Ye Olde College Inn. When it came in I found a mistake and told them about it. They replaced the original but there was another mistake. Again they replaced it - correct this time - and we laminated it to the Plaque along with others. 
The Never Written Story

Low's Reuther: Pap, you could reach Donahue's head?


Louis Reuther: Dennis I'm so dumb I thought Jeff was referring to The Huddle at school?
